## IT WAS RECOGNIZED AS THE "IDEAL RENAISSANCE CITY"

Ferrara was the first modern city in Europe, a rational and harmonious place where architecture, nature, and daily life coexist in balance.

Ferrara is known as the "Italian city of bicycles" thanks to the extensive everyday use by its residents.

Let's not forget the Estense Castle, which frames the city and its charming Renaissance-style streets.



## Estense Castle:

A majestic fortress, surrounded by a moat and drawbridges, that serves as a symbol of the city. The tour inside is truly captivating and allows visitors to fully immerse themselves in court life, taking them from the dungeons to the noble apartments and on to the private chapel.



## San Giorgio Cathedral:

Just a short walk from the castle is the cathedral, which combines several architectural styles: Romanesque, Gothic, and Renaissance. The façade is decorated with stunning bas-reliefs depicting scenes from the Last Judgment and Saint George slaying the dragon. Admission is free.





## Il Quadrivio degli Angeli:

Better known as the Palazzo dei Diamanti, it is a must-see for art lovers. The name comes from the more than 8,500 pyramid-shaped blocks of white marble that adorn its striking façade. Today, it houses the Pinacoteca Nazionale and hosts numerous international exhibitions.

Fun fact: legend has it that a real diamond is hidden inside one of the blocks.



## Le Mura "the city's green embrace":

Stretching 9 kilometers, they encircle the city of Ferrara and are frequented daily by locals for a run, a bike ride, or a simple, relaxing stroll. Don't miss the chance to explore a section of them on foot or by bike.

# RAVENNA

*The city of Mosaics*

RAVENNA, LOCATED IN THE HEART OF ROMAGNA, IS A TREASURE TROVE OF ART AND CULTURE THAT REFLECTS ITS GLORIOUS PAST.

This city, which served as the capital of Italy on three separate occasions—first during the Western Roman Empire, then under Theodoric the Great's Gothic rule, and finally under Byzantine rule—has been enriched with a wide variety of monuments, eight of which have been designated UNESCO World Heritage Sites.

The area surrounding the city offers a wide variety of landscapes, and for nature lovers, the Po Delta Park extends right up to Ravenna.



## The Mausoleum of Theodoric:

Located within a park, it is one of the most famous Ostrogothic funerary structures in Italy.



## Basilica of San Vitale:

Located in the heart of the city, it stands as a testament to the Byzantine Empire.

Inside, visitors can admire the refinement and splendor of its decorations, including the magnificent wall mosaic.



### **Piazza del Popolo:**

The heart of Ravenna is a gathering place for locals, who keep it bustling thanks to the many restaurants and bars in the area.

### **Crypt of the Basilica of St. Francis:**

Originally intended as the tomb of Bishop Neone, its crypt is fascinating because it is decorated with a stunning floor mosaic that is now hidden beneath the ground due to subsidence

**VENICE, ONE OF THE MOST BEAUTIFUL LAGOON CITIES IN ITALY AND THE WORLD.**

The 118 islands that make up Venice are now connected by 400 bridges and separated by canals that serve as streets, traveled daily by boats and gondolas.

Fascinating and one-of-a-kind, it is home to countless artistic treasures, including churches, museums, bridges, and palaces.

Every year, it is a favorite destination for thousands of tourists from all over the world.



### Piazza San Marco:

The only square in Venice is famous worldwide for its architectural beauty.

Right in front of St. Mark's Square, gondolas—the distinctive local boats—are moored, offering rides along the canals.



At the far end of the square stands St. Mark's Basilica, its golden hue captivating the eye.



### Rialto Bridge:

It is the oldest of the four bridges spanning the Grand Canal and was the heart of Venice's economy for many years.

Any time of day is perfect for crossing it and taking wonderful photos.



### The Bridge of Sighs:

Almost fairy-tale-like, it takes your breath away and frames the canal. Once, however, it was the setting for a less romantic story, as it connected the interrogation rooms of the Doge's Palace to the State Prisons; it was here that the condemned passed before being locked in their cells—the last glimmer of light before darkness. It is said that their sighs as they crossed it inspired the name of this bridge, lending a tragic undertone to its beauty.

### Burano and Murano:

To truly experience all that Venice has to offer, you simply must visit the island of Burano, a riot of colors that is a feast for the eyes. In the past, fishermen painted their houses in bright colors so they could easily spot them in the fog. Murano, famous for its blown glass, is home to master glassmakers who jealously guard the secrets of perfect glassmaking.
